First Landing State Park

In 1933, the Commonwealth of Virginia bought the park's more than 2,000 acres from the Cape Henry Syndicate Inc. for \$157,000. The park was built in the early 1930s by mainly African-American CCC workers. It was dedicated June 15, 1936. In 1965 the park's natural area was included in the National Register of Natural Landmarks because of its distinction as the northernmost location on the East Coast where subtropical and temperate plants grow and thrive together. In 1977, the park's trail system was designated as part of the U. S. Department of Interior's National Recreational Trail System.

This park serves as a Virginia Beach Tourism satellite location and has new displays, three indoor aquariums, restrooms, showers and offers water sports rentals. It's Virginia's most popular state park attracting more than a million visitors annually.

Virginia Aquarium



The Virginia Aquarium & Marine Science Center, located near the oceanfront, features a self-guided museum tour. Be sure to visit both buildings, as well as the nature trail that connects them. Allow four-to-five hours for your visit, including a 45 minute IMAX movie.

Bay & Ocean Pavilion

From the rivers to the Chesapeake Bay and finally, into the depths of the Atlantic Ocean, this journey of water through Virginia introduces you to the many aquatic animals and plants that are native to the state. See the largest collection of Chesapeake Bay fishes and meet a horseshoe crab at the Chesapeake Bay touch pool. Observe Loggerhead, Kemp's ridley, and Green turtles in the Chesapeake Light Tower Aquarium. Watch in wonder as sharks, stingrays and other ocean dwellers navigate Norfolk Canyon Aquarium. Learn about the science of oceanography through engaging, hands-on exhibits.

Marsh Pavilion

See river otters, seahorses, snakes and other marsh dwellers. Take a closer look at life in the "macro-marsh," where plants and animals are magnified up to ten times their normal size. Then walk outside on an elevated deck through a half-acre bird aviary to see 55 different species of native birds.

Nature Trail

Enjoy the scenery on this 10-minute walk that meanders through salt marsh and woodland preserve between the Aquarium's buildings. Climb the 30-foot observation tower to get a view of Owls Creek from tree-top level. During the summer, stop by activity carts stationed along the trail, where an educator will provide information on the plants and animals in and around Owls Creek.

Williamsburg Winery

The 320-acre farm, known as Wessex Hundred, is the home of the Williamsburg Winery. Although there are no records to show it, it is assumed that the land was subject to the Actes of 1619 of the House of Burgesses which prescribed that each settler must plant at least 10 vines for the purpose of making wine on his land.

In the 1980's Patrick and Peggy Duffler, interested in commemorating the efforts of the early settlers and in fostering the quality of life in Virginia in the XVIIIth century, were encouraged by the Virginia Department of Agriculture to consider planting vines and making wines. Current production is in excess of 65,000 cases. Guests of the winery are invited to go on a tour and tasting.

Eastern Shore and Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel

Eastern Shore and Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel

Discover tranquil beaches and quaint towns that accent Virginia's Eastern Shore. Take the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel for a retreat to this 70-mile-long, finger-like peninsula, situated between the Atlantic Ocean and the Chesapeake Bay. Explore the numerous barrier islands, wildlife refuges and natural habitats that make this an outdoor-lover's haven.

Enjoy the leisurely pace of old railroad towns and fishing villages along the way. See the region's fishermen haul in their catches of oysters and flounder. Hear the shouts of "saltwater cowboys" herding wild ponies from the Chincoteague and Assateague marshes during the annual round-up.

Discover the legacy of the region's first people as you travel through towns with Indian names such as Kiptopeke, Onancock, Accomac and Wachapreague. Listen for traces of old-world accents in the voices of Tangier Island residents.

The Bridge-Tunnel project is a four-lane 20-mile-long vehicular toll crossing of the lower Chesapeake Bay. The facility carries US 13, the main north-south highway on Virginia's Eastern Shore, and provides the only direct link between Virginia's Eastern Shore and south Hampton Roads, Virginia. The crossing consists of a series of low-level trestles interrupted by two approximately one-mile-long tunnels beneath Thimble Shoals and Chesapeake navigation channels. The manmade islands, each approximately 10 acres in size, are located at each end of the two tunnels. There are also high level bridges over two other navigation channels: North Channel Bridge and Fisherman Inlet Bridge. Finally, between North Channel and Fisherman Inlet, the facility crosses at-grade over Fisherman Island, a barrier island which includes the Fisherman Island National Wildlife Refuge administered by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Toll collection facilities are located at each end of the facility.

Cape Henry Lighthouse

The old Cape Henry Lighthouse is the 3rd oldest lighthouse in the U.S. The original sandstone lighthouse was built in 1792. By 1872 the structure had developed cracks and it was decided to build a new structure. A new cast iron tower was completed in 1881. The new Cape Henry Lighthouse was built to replace the old one in 1881. It sits only 357 feet away from the original and is the tallest cast iron lighthouse in the United States. The 164-foot octagonal tower has been operated by the U.S. Coast Guard since 1939.

During the early part of World War II, the top was used as a battery commander's station for Battery Walke, which contained two 16-inch howitzers.

Although it is not open to the public, it can be seen from the original lighthouse.

The Norfolk Tides at Harbor Park

Home to the Norfolk Tides, the Baltimore Orioles' AAA baseball team, Harbor Park opened its doors in April of 1993. Nestled on the Elizabeth River, the 36-acre Harbor Park the park also hosts NCAA baseball, concerts, high school football and the ever-popular Haunted Harbor Park.

The 12,067 seat stadium boasts 20 luxury suites, press facilities, including two TV broadcasting booths, and a 300-seat restaurant. Harbor Park also features complete picnic area for private parties, as well as an exceptional variety of concession food and beverage for stadium guests.

Perched on the banks of the river, at the eastern-most tip of the downtown waterfront, Harbor Park is within walking distance of The Waterside festival marketplace. Harbor Park was designed by H.O.K. Inc., the same firm that created Chicago's Comiskey Park and Baltimore's Camden Yards.

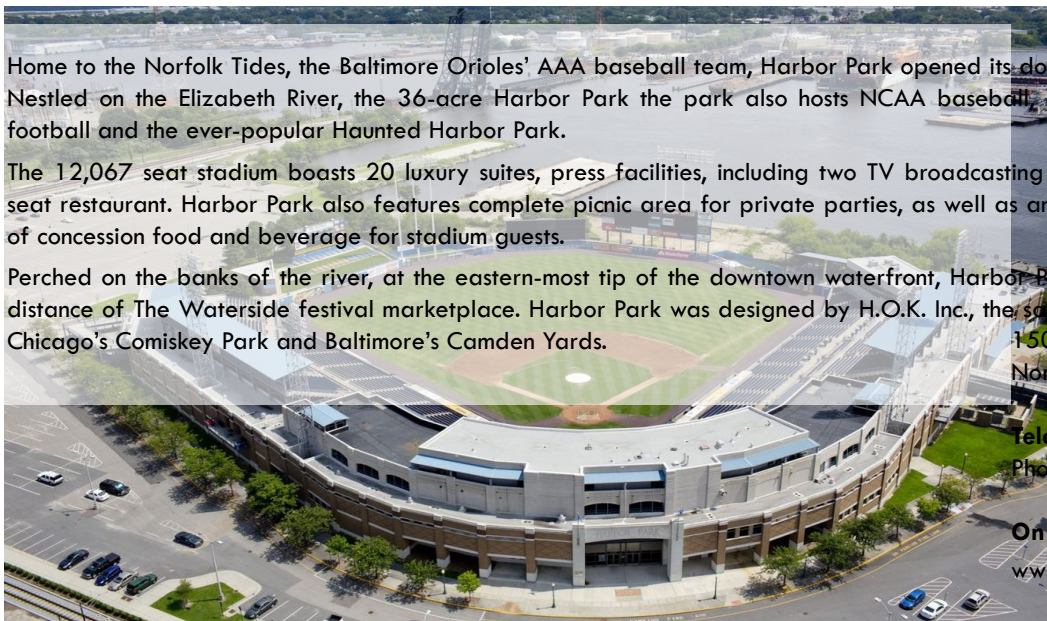

Historic Peninsula War Memorial Stadium in Hampton, Virginia serves as home to the Peninsula's team, the Peninsula Pilots. Construction began on the venerable stadium in 1947 thanks to a regional cooperative venture between the cities of Hampton and Newport News, Va. Construction was completed the following year in 1948, and the facility was given the name War Memorial Stadium as a tribute to those that fought for our nation in WWII. That's when the Brooklyn Dodgers moved their Piedmont League (Class A) operation to town. War Memorial had its first "Home Team." The Newport News Baby Dodgers, and a proud tradition of baseball on the Peninsula, were born.

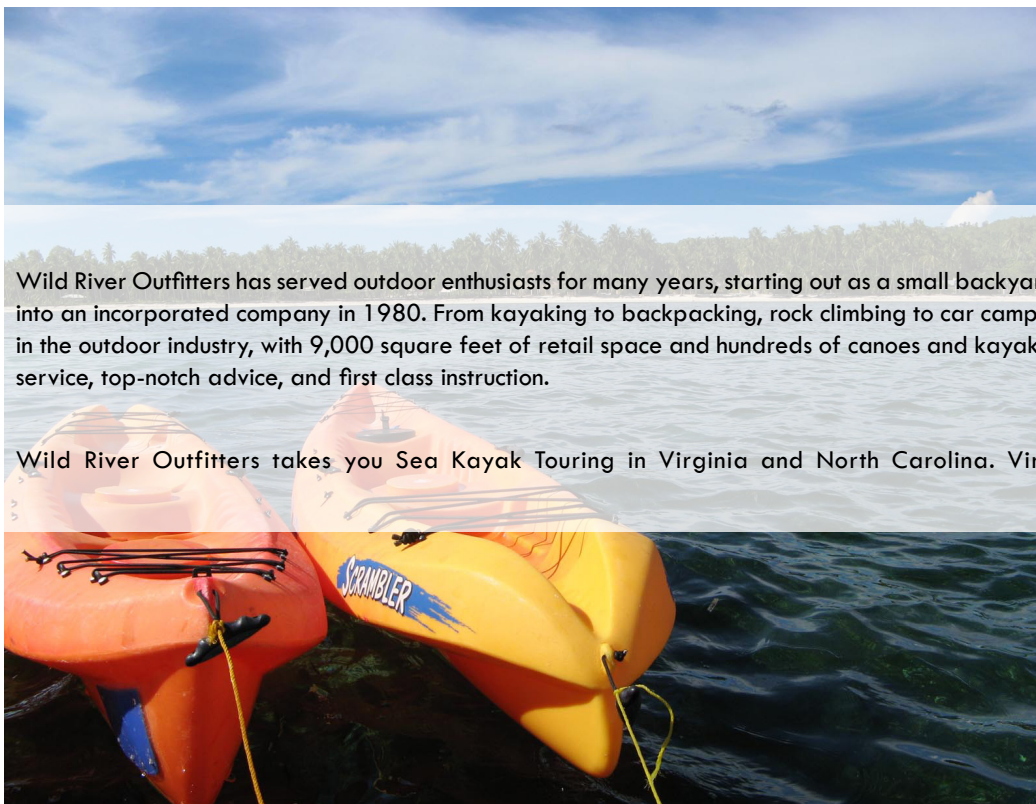

The MacArthur Memorial is a museum dedicated to presenting the life and times of General of the Army Douglas MacArthur. The museum proper is housed in Norfolk's former city hall and courthouse, which was built in 1850 and is designated as both a Virginia Historic Landmark and a National Historic Place.

Planned around an imposing rotunda containing General and Mrs. MacArthur's crypts, nine galleries of exhibits portray the career of one of America's best-known military heroes. Adjacent buildings include a theater with special exhibit galleries, an education facility that houses an extensive archives and library, and a gift shop where General MacArthur's 1950 staff car is on display. These buildings are situated in the attractive, city-centered MacArthur Square.

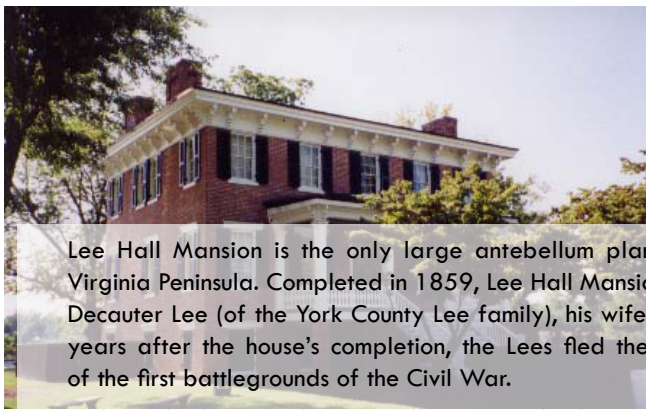

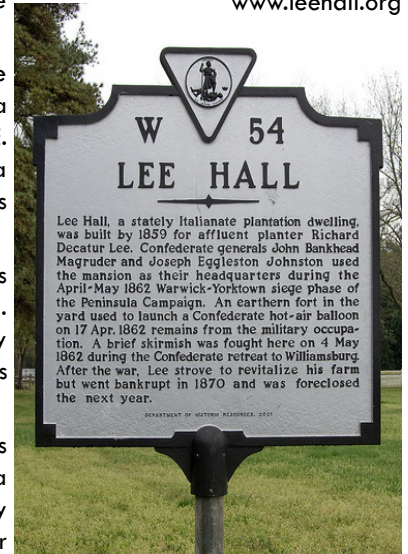

Lee Hall Mansion is the only large antebellum plantation house remaining on the lower Virginia Peninsula. Completed in 1859, Lee Hall Mansion was home to affluent planter Richard Decatur Lee (of the York County Lee family), his wife Martha, and their children. Only three years after the house's completion, the Lees fled their home as the Peninsula became one of the first battlegrounds of the Civil War.

Built on high ground, Lee Hall Mansion had a natural and commanding view of the countryside. Consequently, between April and May of 1862, the house was used as a Confederate headquarters by Major General John B. Magruder and General Joseph E. Johnston. From this location, Magruder and Johnston directed the defense of the Peninsula against Major General George B. McClellan's advancing Union Army, and for three weeks delayed the Union advance.

However, on May 3, 1862, the Confederate Army was ordered to retreat. A small skirmish was fought on the property by the retreating Confederates and Union cavalry on May 4, 1862. The Peninsula remained under Union control until the end of the war. The Lees eventually returned to the house and resided there until 1871. Since then, many different individuals have owned Lee Hall Mansion.

The City of Newport News purchased Lee Hall Mansion in 1996, restoring the house to its antebellum appearance. Now an historic house museum documenting the 1862 Peninsula Campaign, Lee Hall Mansion's decorated rooms and the 1862 Peninsula Campaign Gallery are open to the public. Special programs and lectures are offered throughout the year interpreting how the Civil War forever changed the fabric of American society.



Colonial Williamsburg

Colonial Williamsburg and the Williamsburg Foundation

Williamsburg was the thriving capital of Virginia when the dream of American freedom and independence was taking shape and the colony was a rich and powerful land stretching west to the Mississippi River and north to the Great Lakes. For 81 formative years, from 1699 to 1780, Williamsburg was the political, cultural, and educational center of what was then the largest, most populous, and most influential of the American colonies. It was here that the fundamental concepts of our republic — responsible leadership, a sense of public service, self-government, and individual liberty — were nurtured under the leadership of patriots such as George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, George Mason, and Peyton Randolph.

Near the end of the Revolutionary War and through the influence of Thomas Jefferson, the seat of government of Virginia was moved up the peninsula to the safer and more centrally located city of Richmond. For nearly a century and a half afterward, Williamsburg was a simple, quiet college town, home of the College of William and Mary.

The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation is a private, not-for-profit educational institution that receives no regular state or federal funding.

The Foundation preserves and interprets the Historic Area, operates for-profit subsidiaries, (including hotels, restaurants, convention facilities, and golf courses), and sells licensed products and reproductions. In addition to the Historic Area, the foundation also operates, The DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum, The Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Museum, Bassett Hall, and John D. Rockefeller Jr. Library.

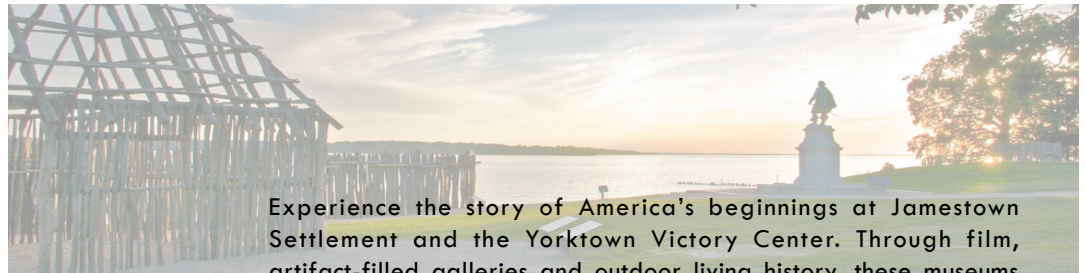
Today at Jamestown Settlement, the story of the people who founded Jamestown and of the Virginia Indians they encountered is told through film, gallery exhibits and living history. Expansive gallery exhibits and an introductory film trace Jamestown's beginnings in England and the first century of the Virginia colony and describe the cultures of the Powhatan Indians, Europeans and Africans who converged in 1600s Virginia. Outdoors, visitors can board replicas of the three ships that sailed from England to Virginia in 1607, explore life-size re-creations of the colonists' fort and a Powhatan village, and tour a seasonal riverfront discovery area to learn about European, Powhatan and African economic activities associated with water. In the outdoor areas, costumed historical interpreters describe and demonstrate daily life in the early 17th century.

Today at the Yorktown Victory Center, America's evolution from colonial status to nationhood is chronicled through a unique blend of timeline, film, thematic exhibits and outdoor living history. An outdoor exhibit walkway details events that led to American colonies to declare independence from Britain.

Indoor exhibition galleries recount the war's effect on 10 ordinary men and women who witnessed the Revolutionary War, highlight the roles of different nationalities in the Siege of Yorktown and explore the story of the Betsy and other British ships lost in the York River during the war. Exhibits also describe experiences of ordinary soldiers, Yorktown's importance as an 18th-century port and the development of a new government with the Constitution and Bill of Rights. Outdoors, visitors can explore a re-created Continental Army encampment, where historical interpreters describe and depict daily life of American soldiers at the end of the war. A re-created 1780s farm, complete with a house, kitchen, tobacco barn, crop fields, and herb and vegetable garden, shows how many Americans lived in the decade following the Revolutionary War.

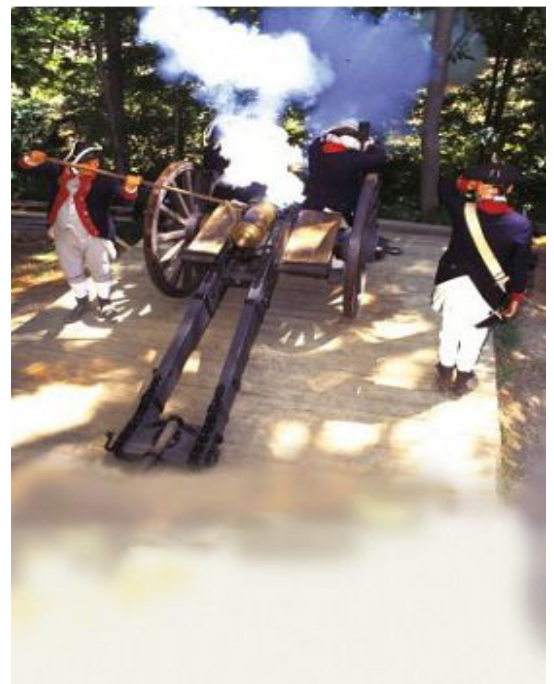

Costumed historical interpreters depict daily lives of people two and three centuries ago in faithfully re-created settings - a Powhatan Indian village, three replica ships and palisaded colonial fort at Jamestown Settlement and Revolutionary War encampment and 1780s farm at the Yorktown Victory Center. There, grind corn, steer with a whipstaff, try on English armor, enlist in the Continental Army or assist with farm chores.

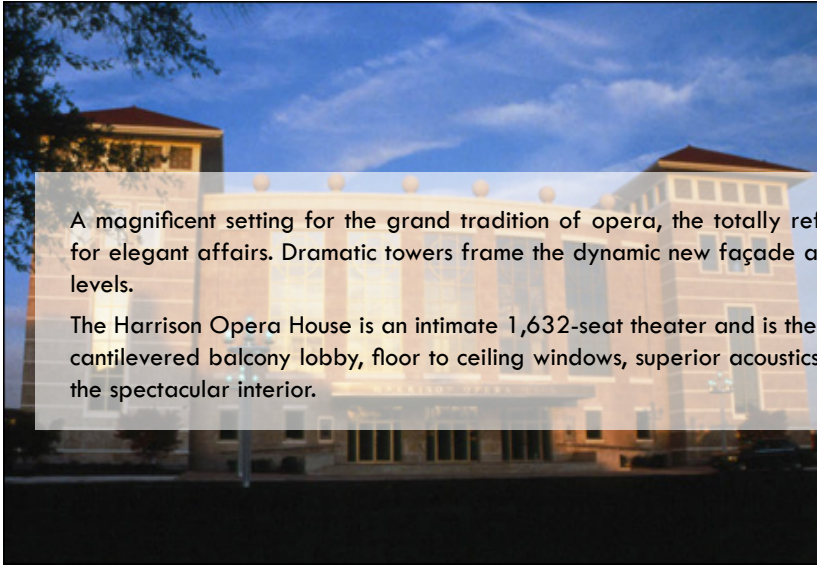

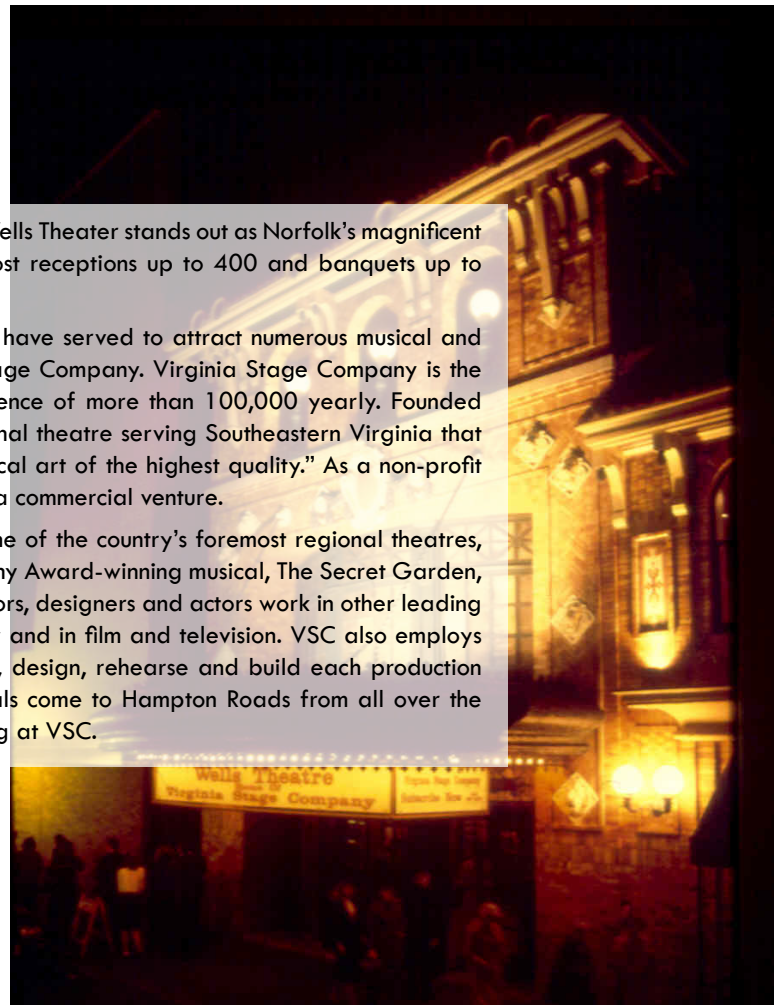

Located on a beautiful waterfront sight facing the Hague inlet of Norfolk's historic Elizabeth River, the Museum building houses 60 elegant and restful galleries, an auditorium, gift shop, restaurant, the Jean Outland Chrysler Library, and support spaces arranged around a skylit central courtyard. In 1997 the Museum completed a new education wing including spaces for hands-on art classes and new galleries for its celebrated collection of American neo-classical sculpture. The Museum's historic Willoughby-Baylor, and Moses Myers houses are located nearby.

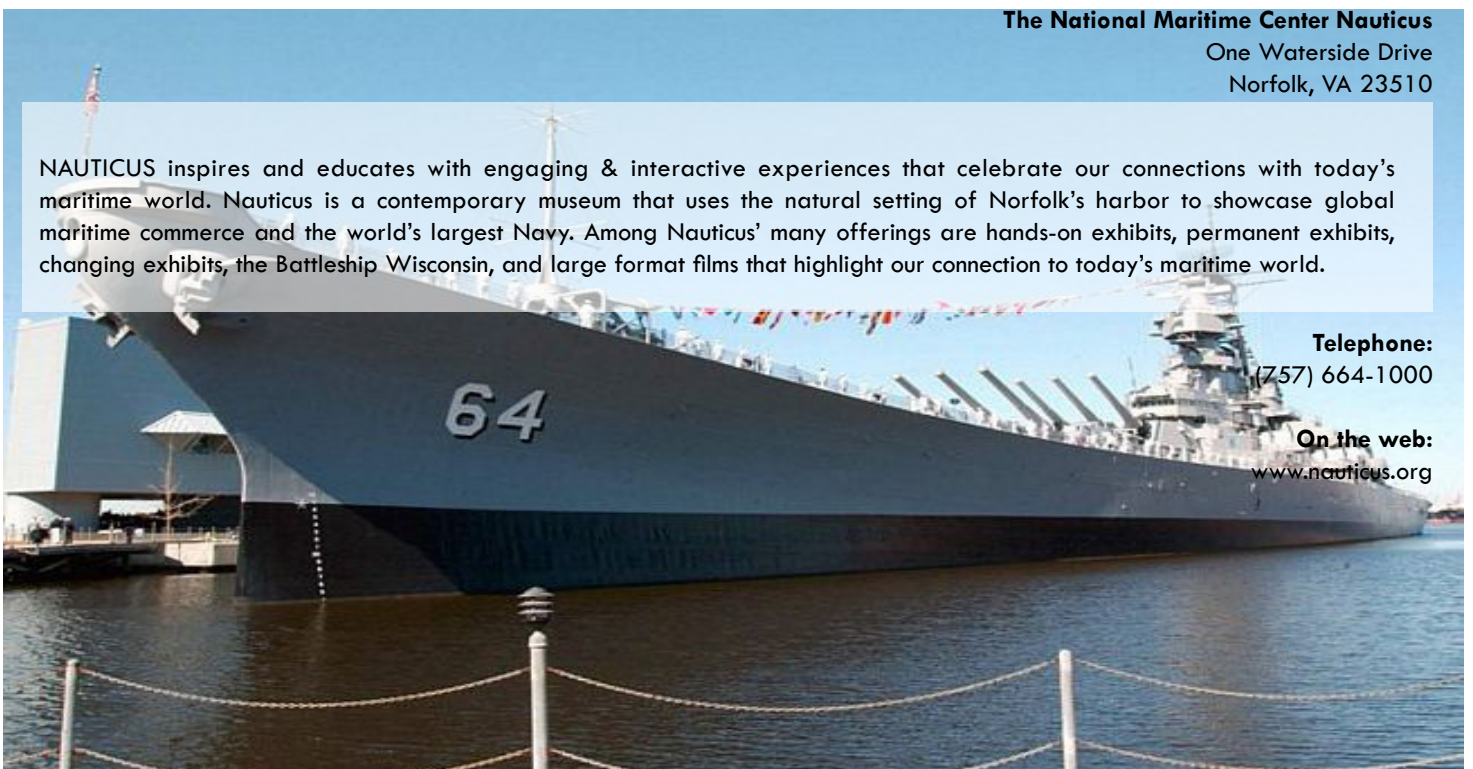

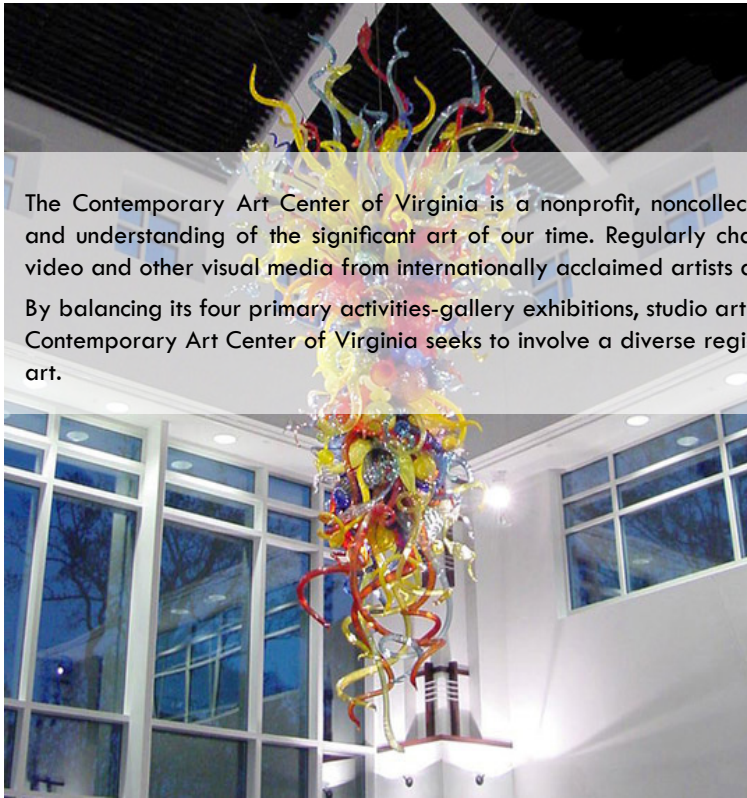
